its reason for being and its responsbilities. "All the children are well" means, that life is good. It means that the daily struggles of existence do not preclude proper care for the young.



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


Are we preparing students for our present or their future?

How has the Common Core improved the overall classroom experience?

Student curriculum continues to be aligned with the learning standards necessary in both math and ELA/ literacy. The dynamics of the classroom have changed. You can hear and see the engagement among students during class discussions and group work. Students are understanding, debating, questioning, and challenging each other's thinking. In a more collaborative culture, students are examining the world around them with increased interest and attention.

Our schools have started using an innovative diagnostic assessment called i-Ready®for students in grades K-12. i-Ready Diagnostic and Instruction is an online, interactive learning environment designed to assess students and then provide individualized instruction based on each student's unique needs. The exciting format and engaging content, as well as the Study Buddies and other interesting, contemporary characters, draw in students right away.

The i-Ready experience builds students' investment in their learning by giving them real-time feedback on their progress in each skill. As students complete each assignment successfully, they earn credits that they can use to play games. i-Ready Diagnostic and Instruction also provides opportunities to learn both at school and at home.





EARLY LITERACY INITIATIVE UPDATE What are we doing to create greater support for young readers?

We are focused on teaching every child to read for understanding before they enter the third grade. It's the year that students move from "learning to read" to "reading to learn". The books students are expected to master are no longer simple primers but fact-filled texts in subject areas like science and social studies. If a student hasn't mastered literacy in the early years of kindergarten through second grade (K-2), then it is at this moment we see children fall behind, and for most of them the achievement gap could continue to grow.


LITERACY SUPPORT: Early Literacy Specialists have been hired to provide enrichment, acceleration, tutorial support for all K-2 students in need of additional help and support. Early Literacy Teaching Assistants have also been hired to provide push-in support to all Grade K-1 classes.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT: We have provided all K-2 teachers with intensive professional development from the Core Knowledge Professional Development Team on the theory, practice, and implementation of the Core Knowledge Curriculum. A partnership with SWBOCES, provides ongoing training for teachers in the areas of Interactive Writing and Evidence Based Questioning. All K-2 teachers are receiving Google Nexus© tablets to support the implementation of the Core Knowledge Program. All K-2 teachers receive continuous professional development in the Core Knowledge Program, as well as best practices and strategies to support Common Core Learning Standards. How will technology innovations support the creation of high performing school systems?

Today, the newest set of tools are becoming more and more present in Mount Vernon. The digital push in education aims to go far beyond gadgets to transform the very nature of the classroom, turning the teacher into a guide instead of a lecturer, wandering among students who learn at their own pace on Internet-connected devices. Interactive whiteboards and mobile technology can be seen being incorporated into the learning experience of students all around Mount Vernon schools.

Ongoing technology upgrades are taking place across the district. With the digitizing of records and a streamlined equipment tracking system. The Board of Education has also made great strides to introduce ways in which it can reduce paper costs, free-up building space, and provide more efficient access to data and resources. COLLEGE AND CAREER READY Senior Student Reports from the Halls of Thornton High School

Even with honors and great grades, many parents and teachers don't realize how uneasy many students are about the two big 'C's (college and career). So, I decided to ask our student body three simple, yet complex, questions concerning college and career readiness and revealed the following:



What does it mean to be college and career ready? "Following your dreams. Reaching the future. I think it means you're ready to go out in the world and work for what you want. If you want to be a doctor, you go to college and graduate college in order to reach your dreams. To be college and career ready to me is to be mature and mentally prepared. I don't know what to expect once I reach college, however, I know I'll be ready. I know I'll be ready because I'm mature enough to handle myself in a more rigorous environment."

Do you think or feel that you are college and career ready? "I have no idea what college I want to go to. But I do know two things - I want to be a professional actor and I have a long road ahead full of hard work and hard choices. I am uncertain about many things. What should I major in? Even though advanced placement courses in high school have prepped me for college and given me an idea of what my workload will be like, I fear the unknown."

What would help you feel more college and career ready? "I wish the school had a drama department. I would love to see more plays and even musicals in school so I could be better prepared for what to expect in a drama program. My school can become more college and career ready by taking us out on more college visits. Also by offering more job fairs and assisting us in achieving work experience or volunteer experience."

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SCHOOL RESTRUCTURING PLAN

Why restructure now?

The Board of Education has decided it will move forward with implementing a comprehensive restructuring plan utilizing a multi-year approach in an effort to better serve diverse communities of children while also optimizing school building resources. This decision incorporates a number of strategic initiatives currently in place to improve the quality of education offered in Mount Vernon.

Why has it been decided to move forward with a K-8 model?

In early 2013, various community stakeholders - including parents and educators - were invited to participate in a research effort aimed at identifying the feasibility of various grade configurations within elementary schools. After three months of research and review, the advisory group led by an expert facilitator, recommended a K-8 configuration utilizing variations of single buildings and paired campus buildings. With students in these combined settings staying together longer, the anticipated benefits included:

- Greater long-term student achievement
- Optimal distribution of school building and central office resources
- More comprehensive access to curriculum across grade levels
- Stronger sense of community within school buildings for students, parents, and staff

What schools have been identified for the first phase and why?


Comprehensive restructuring will require a considerable amount of careful planning and thoughtful implementation. Lessons learned from the past restructuring efforts will support decisions going forward. With a promise and commitment to see this restructuring effort through for many years, the Board of Education has decided on a phased multi-year approach approach starting with four schools for the 2014/2015 school year. These schools include Pennington and Graham as single K-8 buildings (7th grade being added in the 2014/2015 school year and 8th grade in 2015/2016) and Longfellow Elementary and Middle as a paired school campus (PreK-5 and 6-8).
