

DISTRICT LOOKS TO FUTURE WITH 20/20 VISION

Superintendent Unveils Plan for Districtwide Excellence

At a recent school board meeting, Mount Vernon City Schools Superintendent Dr. Kenneth R. Hamilton unveiled his "20/20 vision" for the district. His goal, to create enhanced educational programs within a rejuvenated school system, was met with excitement and approval from both the community and Trustees present. His vision, including plans for two districtwide full-day pre-K "early learning centers" and plans to expand the district's K-8 initiative to include all elementary schools, will provide enhanced educational programs for all students.

"All-day pre-K leads to early literacy, which is essential to student success," said Dr. Hamilton. "K-8 buildings provide the continuity of care students need for emotional and academic stability."

Dr. Hamilton's vision calls for the development of three high schools as "schools of excellence," incorporating the arts, science and technology. If approved, Thornton High School would become a performing arts high school, while Mount Vernon High School would focus its programs on career and technical education, and the International Baccalaureate program. Additionally, A.B. Davis Middle School would once again serve high school students, this time as a STEAM school (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics).

"We owe it to our students to restore excellence to every school in this district," said Dr. Hamilton. "These schools will raise rigor through multiple pathways to college or the workforce and quality instructional programs." Dr. Hamilton's vision requires the support of infrastructure upgrades to existing buildings districtwide. For example, pre-K classrooms will need bathrooms, and K-8 buildings will need science labs. New and improved athletic fields and play areas are also part of Dr. Hamilton's vision.

BACKPACK PROGRAM FEEDS NEEDY CHILDREN AWAY FROM SCHOOL

In an effort to assure that its neediest students don't go hungry when they are away from school, the Mount Vernon City School District has teamed up with the Food Bank for Westchester to provide a BackPack Program. As its name implies, the program sends at-risk students home with a backpack, but the backpack is filled with food, not books.

"This program is part of Mount Vernon City School District's continuing effort to strengthen the home-to-school connection," said Superintendent of Schools Dr. Kenneth Hamilton. "We make sure our students get the nutritious lunches they need while they're at school. This program enables us to make sure the neediest children are fed after they leave our care."

The BackPack Program is designed to help alleviate child hunger by providing hungry and at-risk children with nutritious, easy-to-prepare food on weekends and school vacations. Each backpack has six meals and includes protein, milk, fruit, grain and vegetables. In the backpack, there is also a recipe in English and Spanish. Being very aware that children receiving backpacks likely will share the food with siblings and other family members, care is taken to pack food items that can be easily shared and/or can contribute to a family meal.

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NATIONAL PARK SERVICE HONORS TURNER SCHOOLS

The National Park Service hosted a recognition ceremony for the renaming of two Mount Vernon City School District (MVCSD) schools as part of its nationwide centennial celebration in early October. The two schools, which were renamed in May, honor Rebecca and Benjamin Turner, former slaves who established a homestead and raised a family near Saint Paul's Church in the city. The schools are now named the Benjamin Turner Middle School and the Rebecca Turner Elementary School.

The event – held at St. Paul's National Historic Site, located at 897 S. Columbus Ave., Mount Vernon – acknowledged the local renaming efforts of Dr. Larry Spruill, city historian, and former MVCSD Trustee Elias Gootzeit. The event included music on the church's historic Erben pipe organ, student presentations, traditional African drummers leading the procession to the grave site and a floral homage at the grave of Rebecca Turner in the Saint Paul's Church yard. It celebrated the centennial of the National Park Service's efforts to foster a more complete understanding of our nation's history and urge a more inclusive future. All 4th and 7th graders in attendance were deemed "National Park Rangers" for the day. The students were welcomed to the 350-year-old church by Dr. David Osborn, site manager at St. Paul's Church, NPS Park Ranger Vladimir Merzlyakov and Dr. Kenneth R. Hamilton, Superintendent of Mount Vernon City School District. Dr. Osborn noted that the Turners sat in the same church, heard the same bell ring and listened to the same organ play when they were parishioners.

"This is a great opportunity to celebrate the Turners' legacy in Mount Vernon and demonstrate to our students and families the rich cultural heritage of Mount Vernon and the beginnings of a rejuvenation of this city's schools," Dr. Hamilton said.

Rebecca Turner's 93 years spanned the American Revolution to the post-Civil War period, from her own enslavement to emancipation, all in the shadows of St. Paul's Church where she is buried. (The grave site of Benjamin Turner, who died decades before Rebecca, remains unknown.)



NEW PRE-K PROGRAM BRINGS NEW HOPE FOR STUDENTS AND FAMILIES

A fter a summer filled with curriculum writing, renovations and planning, the Mount Vernon City School District opened the doors to its new full-day prekindergarten program at Mount Vernon High School on September 2. Parents, students, staff and dignitaries were overcome with hope as the new pre-K classrooms were unveiled.

Standing before a crowd of parents, teachers, administrators and elected officials, Pre-K Director Dr. Gayle White-Wallace spoke about the importance of prekindergarten in the development of student learners. "Studies have shown that children who attend pre-K are more likely to graduate high school. That is why this =full-day program is so critical here in Mount Vernon."

Offering full-day prekindergarten is part of the district's Early Literacy Initiative. The district's vision is steeped in early literacy research, supporting the efforts of a rich pre-K-2 program, which will eventually lead to better outcomes or more college and career students.

The three full-day classes revolve around the Constructivist Method. The Big Day Pre-K program provides students with enriching literacy, mathematics, science and social studies experiences. Big Day Pre-K curriculum teaches important content through learning centers, art, music and cooperative learning experiences.

"This exposure will place our students on a secure footing to be successful as they enter kindergarten," said Superintendent Dr. Kenneth R. Hamilton.

The classrooms offer students an exceptional space to both learn and grow. The newly renovated classrooms feature many pre-K classroom amenities, such as a dramatic play area, smart boards, reading centers and classroom meeting spaces.

"Parents and families are an important part of this endeavor," said Dr. White-Wallace. "Our new full-day pre-K program, combined with innovative technology and enhanced learning spaces, will help students become successful in the years that follow, and the combined teamwork of having engaged families will support their success."

SUPERINTENDENT'S 2015-2016 READING CHALLENGE BEGINS

The Mount Vernon City School District officially kicked off its 2015-2016 Superintendent's Reading Challenge with events in each school building during the second part of October. The kickoff events were filled with music, performances and surprises to excite students and promote literacy both at home and in the schools.

The biggest surprise, by far, was the introduction of OLI the Octopus, the reading challenge's premier student motivator. OLI, which stands for Ongoing Literacy Initiative, will visit schools throughout the academic year to encourage students to take part in the reading challenge and check on their progress.

Based on a children's book character developed by District Clerk Rick McCormack and Superintendent of Schools Dr. Kenneth R. Hamilton, OLI is "sure to motivate the students and help create excitement about reading across the district," McCormack said.

District officials are so confident students can read more that they have set this year's goal at well over a quarter million books (K-2 students 35 books and 3-8 students 30 books). "I see no reason why our students can't read 300,000 books before the end of the school year," Dr. Hamilton said. "I have full confidence that our students will not only meet this goal, but also exceed it."





While last year's Challenge was successful, District Reading Challenge Coordinator Dr. Gayle White-Wallace knows that "our students can do even more to promote literacy and develop strong reading habits."

2015 STAR SCHOLARS ARE SELECTED FOR COLLEGE PREPAREDNESS PROGRAM

Mount Vernon City School District selected four students as its 2015 Mount Vernon Star Scholars. The selected class of 2017 students are Agustin Mendoza, Michael Persaud, Taury Phelps and Judy Yu.

The Mount Vernon Star Scholars (MVSS) program was established in 2012 under the original direction of Mount Vernon residents Norm Savoie and Darcy Miller. The purpose of the program was to assist a select group of academically talented students at Mount Vernon high schools in gaining admission to selective colleges and universities in the U.S. The star scholars receive valuable one-on-one guidance from a volunteer mentor.

"The students honored this year will receive assistance in important areas such as test preparation and securing financial aid," said Miller. "The volunteer mentors will help the star scholars navigate the complex college application process every step of the way."

The program is open to all students enrolled in one of the Mount Vernon high schools who maintain a weightedaverage GPA of 85 or better. Scholars are chosen in the summer between their sophomore and junior year, based primarily on their academic achievement in their first two years of high school and their commitment to continuing their education at the undergraduate level upon graduation from high school. While the designation is not specifically need-based, a student's challenges in attending a top-tier institution of higher learning, including financial challenges, are factored into the selection process.

While the program is still young, MVSS alumni can now be found on the campuses of Case Western Reserve University, Denison University, Harvard University and the University of Connecticut. With sufficient resources, the program would like to be able to select five to eight scholars each year.

Mount Vernon Schools Become Energy Efficient

The Mount Vernon City School District made history in July when it awarded a nearly \$40 million energy performance contract (EPC) to Honeywell Building Solutions. From all accounts, this is the largest EPC ever awarded by a school district in New York State.

Through the EPC, the Mount Vernon City School District will take significant steps to become energy efficient by upgrading or replacing significant numbers of aged and/or obsolete infrastructure including boilers, lighting fixtures and ventilation systems.

According to Ken Silver, Assistant Superintendent for Business, "Over the next 12 to 18 months, the district will replace 34 boilers in 15 buildings. These are some of the oldest boilers in the district that literally cost thousands of dollars and countless man-hours each year to maintain. They will be replaced with state-ofthe-art, energy efficient equipment that will provide worry-free heat to our buildings for years to come."
